COMMUNITY SUPPORTER SPOTLIGHT

These meaningful partnerships have truly exemplified how community groups can work alongside KYCC to champion the children and families of Koreatown. Thank you to Alo Yoga, Bella + Canvas, and LAFC TSG for their unwavering support and service to our community.

Based in Koreatown, the Los Angeles Football Club Tigers Supporters Group (LAFC TSG) have been active volunteers, supporting the work of KYCC since 2019. From our Environmental Services community beautification and tree planting events, COVID-19 meal delivery, and Holiday Carnival, members of LAFC TSG have participated in a variety of programs that serve the community. They have also organized efforts to engage with the youth and clients that KYCC serves, including leading a workshop series with our high school students to create Tigers Supporters Group flags and hosting a drive where they raised \$2,700 to purchase housing essentials for the new residents of KYCC's Ambrose Apartments.



Over the past two years, the sister companies of Alo Yoga and Bella + Canvas have joined KYCC as corporate volunteer partners engaged in supporting the mission of KYCC. This year, both companies supported our Holiday Carnival by hosting two toy drives with employees, helping to raise a record number of 652 toys for the children in our community. Alo Yoga has engaged with our Environmental Services work by helping to plant trees throughout Koreatown, and also donated 30 yoga mats to KYCC's Koreatown Storytelling Program for a yoga workshop with elder residents at St. James Manor, a senior living home in Koreatown.

Koreatown Storytelling Program (KSP) Associate

Dilan Askew is KYCC's Koreatown Storytelling Program (KSP) Associate who learned about KYCC through the LA County Department of Arts and Culture Arts Internship Program leading into her senior year of college. Through her internship, she immersed herself into the world of storytelling. "The work of listening to, documenting, and sharing the stories of Koreatown and its community members felt so gratifying...like I was protecting the stories of people who are similar to my family's own narratives," says Dilan.

Throughout her time with KSP, from intern to now staff, Dilan's favorite part of her role has been meeting the youth that come through the program, as she is able to witness their journey of growing into their own, gaining confidence, and going off to attend their dream schools. Her work has also allowed her to facilitate meaningful intergenerational relationships, which have helped her learn about Koreatown and gain new perspectives.

Reflecting upon the impact this work has had on her, she shares, "I get firsthand knowledge and tangible experiences that show how vital and important storytelling is to community and to cultivating care and empathy across all different types of divides...KSP has gifted me the language to explain my own draw to storytelling and provided a space where I get to actively participate in it."



OMAR AMADOR

Prevention Specialist

Omar Amador was first introduced to KYCC through our Youth Services program. Looking for an opportunity where he could work with and mentor youth, he joined KYCC as an intern for our afterschool program where he met our team of teachers and staff who were dedicated to engaging with families and community partners who came through KYCC's doors. Over his time working with Youth Services, he formed memorable connections and bonds with the staff and students, which left a profound impact on him and allowed him to realize that he was in the right place.

Since moving into his role with our Prevention Education team as a Prevention Specialist, he is able to continue working with a diverse group of individuals, who truly care about the communities that they serve. The projects he encounters in his role are all working towards "helping prevent youth from accessing and using substances," says Omar. "In that sense, I am helping youth in the form of education, engagement, and mentorship."

Having found his calling in helping others, Omar is currently finishing up his Masters of Social Work graduate school program, where he is able to coincide his studies with the practices and tools he has gained through his time with KYCC.

STOP AAPI HATE

"It is our commitment to protect the community, and not let these problems arise," says RFX1. "If people can come together for a common goal, such as protecting their community, then the city would be able to grow and thrive...It is up to the people to make where they live a better place for everyone."


Funded by the California Department of Social Services, KYCC's Environmental Services and Community Planning & Development programs collaborated to launch a campaign in which artists were selected to paint utility boxes throughout Koreatown. These utility boxes highlight the strength and beauty of our neighborhood, while also raising awareness about the rise in hate against our AAPI communities.

Reflecting upon the importance of this project, Gabriela Magaña, KYCC's Community Planning and Development Specialist shares, "Communities are made up of different cultures and identities, and the strongest communities happen when everyone comes together to support each other...When you see art in your community that accurately reflects you, the places you've been, and your history, that not only makes you feel like you belong, but also that your community is working for you as well."

Local artist, RFX1, launched the campaign with his utility box depicting a dragon protecting the city, fusing imagery of an old Korean village with contemporary Koreatown. The traditional Korean architecture symbolizes our elders, who were the primary targets during the first wave of hostility against AAPI communities, with the soaring dragon shown as a protective symbol over our neighborhood.

These utility boxes will serve as reminders of the importance of standing up for our community, protecting our elders, and fighting injustice, melding the worlds of art and social justice to foster identity and belonging within our community.

KTOWN BEAUTIFUL CLEANUPS

In March, KYCC Environmental Services launched the Ktown Beautiful campaign to help beautify the streets of Koreatown and its surrounding areas. Since its inception, our team has worked with over 375 volunteers from the community and helped pick up over 311 bags of loose litter and 79 bulky items from our streets.

"Collaboration is an important part of beautification. The unity and optimism that a cleanup event brings can be rewarding to yourself, and also to the community around you," says KYCC Environmental Services Beautification Coordinator, Alberto Soria.

"Without the support of our community members in these clean ups, our neighborhoods would not look the same."

AMBROSE APARTMENTS + HOUSING OUTREACH

This year, we opened our Ambrose Apartments which houses 63 residents, all of whom are formerly unhoused seniors. KYCC's Housing Services team at Ambrose provides permanent supportive housing and case management services to help our residents expand on their life skills and maintain their housing stability, as they enter this new chapter in life.

Part of the Housing Services team's work at Ambrose also involves the role of homeless outreach, a new effort in the realm of KYCC housing work. Sarah Chang, KYCC's Outreach and Prevention Coordinator, supports the team by providing outreach to the unhoused Korean community, a demographic that is impacted due to language inaccessibility.

"It's tough being unhoused and not being able to speak English...which puts KYCC in such a special place because we're able to serve that demographic that gets lost in the homeless count every year and that slip through the cracks," says Sarah.

Through her work in prevention efforts, she is able to advocate for the monolingual Korean community, helping them access housing related resources and connecting them to prevention programs led by our various community partners, who now lean on KYCC as a bridge to assist the unhoused Korean population throughout Los Angeles.

The work of KYCC Housing Services continues to provide permanent supportive housing, share resources, and increase housing stability for our unhoused neighbors throughout Los Angeles.

WALK AUDITS

Community Planning and Development, one of KYCC's newest programs, hosted a series of walk audits throughout Koreatown, working alongside community members to survey the built environment and landscape of our neighborhood.

Funded by the Southern California Association of Governments, the walk audits took volunteers from the community along various routes in Koreatown, as they walked and rode Metro buses to make observations and provide recommendations, in an effort to help improve mobility for pedestrians, cyclists, and those who rely on public transportation.

"[Koreatown] has a demographic that relates to mobility needs, with a higher need for public transportation," says Shawn Kuk, KYCC's Director of Community Planning and Development.

"I would like for our community members to be a part of these conversations, and moving forward, with decisions and changes that are made in the neighborhood."

The work of Community Planning and Development aims to support the building of a healthier, more sustainable, and equitable Koreatown. There are pressing needs for more parks, green space, affordable housing, and improved conditions for pedestrians and public transit riders, but it is critical that we move forward with solutions that are culturally-specific, paying close attention to the quality of our public spaces.





SMALL BUSINESS HIGHLIGHT: TEMO EL RANCHERO

Juan Pablo and his wife, Lucina, are the owners of Temo El Ranchero, a catering business specializing in mouthwatering barbecued meat known as “Carne a la Barbacoa.” After getting married in 2000, Juan and Lucina decided to start their family business and have spent the past two decades perfecting their unique recipe for a perfect plate of Barbacoa de Res.

With growing popularity among friends and acquaintances for their delicious food, Juan and Lucina were met with the challenge of lacking a health permit, preventing them from offering their catering services in salons or private events, due to their operations being based out of a home kitchen. Over the course of seven years, they tirelessly searched for a shared commercial kitchen but were faced with constant hurdles and disappointment.

Juan was determined to find a solution, and came across KYCC’s Small Business Program. Our small business counselors helped Juan successfully secure a commercial kitchen space, and were able to guide him through the process of obtaining the permits and certifications he needed to operate on a larger scale. Now with a health permit, California seller’s permit, Business Tax Registration Certificate, and food liability insurance, Juan and Lucina have been able to take their business to new heights.

This newfound legitimacy for Temo El Ranchero has allowed them to cater their delicious barbacoa on a larger scale, serving over 600 people at one event. Expressing his gratitude for what he has been able to accomplish with KYCC, Juan says,

“The support we received from KYCC was a game-changer for our business. Finally being able to operate legally and participate in larger events has brought us tremendous opportunities. We are forever grateful for the guidance on permits, and certifications provided by KYCC. It has truly elevated our catering business to a new level.”

Juan and Lucina’s journey with Temo El Ranchero from being a home-based catering service, to an established successful business is a testament to the work of KYCC and our partnership as part of the SBA’s Community Navigators Pilot Program. The support has allowed them to overcome hurdles that held them back for decades, as their dreams of sharing their special Barbacoa de Res with so many, have become a reality.

OUR SERVICES

Clinical Services

Clinical Services offers culturally and linguistically appropriate counseling services for low-income children, youth, and their families. Individual and family therapy, case management, and medication support services are provided in outpatient, school-based, and in-home settings. Clinical Services also offers educational workshops, parenting groups, parent and me groups, youth activity groups, parent self-care events, and family events.

Community Economic Development

Community Economic Development programs and services focus on building community wealth by helping families achieve financial stability. We offer financial education, individual case management, and matched savings accounts to help families increase financial capability and reach their individual goals. KYCC owns 209 low-income housing units at 8 locations, providing affordable housing and social services for the tenants. KYCC’s Free Tax Prep Los Angeles campaign educates eligible households about the Earned Income Tax Credit and provides free tax assistance to nearly 15,683 households. Our Small Business Development program provides free technical assistance to small businesses and entrepreneurs to provide economic opportunities in our community. KYCC also offers utility assistance programs to help non-English speakers resolve their billing issues.

Enhanced Care Management

Enhanced Care Management is a free-of-cost MediCal service that provides case management services to address physical, behavioral, and social service needs. Our case managers are there to support with access and advocacy for services. To qualify you need to be either 18 years of age or older and have either LA Care or HealthNet insurance.

Environmental Services

The vision of Environmental Services is to engage communities in creating safe, healthy, and beautiful neighborhoods. KYCC works with residents and groups to plant, distribute, care for and learn about our community trees. KYCC beautifies Koreatown and surrounding neighborhoods by leading community cleanups and service projects, and increasing safety by removing graffiti free of charge, seven days a week. Through neighborhood beautification and environmental education, KYCC is helping to make Los Angeles a cleaner, greener, and more liveable city.

Housing Services

Housing Services operates eight affordable housing projects totalling 209 units and provides supportive housing services to unhoused and formerly unhoused clients at six KYCC-owned housing projects in Koreatown and surrounding neighborhoods. KYCC also provides supportive housing-related services including Intensive Case Management Services, Recovery Re-Housing Program to help unhoused clients attain housing, and Community Food Program which distributes groceries and other essentials.

Kids Town

KYCC’s Kids Town Preschool provides quality early childhood education for 72 children from the ages of 2.5 to 5 years. Our progressive philosophy emphasizes creative exploration in a developmentally appropriate environment, where children can learn, grow, and develop at their own pace. Activities are designed to promote high self-esteem, independent learning, and lifelong feelings of competence. The center is open Monday through Friday, from 7:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m., year-round to meet the needs of working families.

Koreatown Storytelling Program

Koreatown Storytelling Program is an intergenerational, multilingual and multiethnic oral history and digital media program that teaches ethnographic and storytelling techniques to high school students and elders to investigate cultural practices and racial, economic and health inequities in our community. The program promotes greater understanding and respect between generations and documents marginalized narratives for preservation in public archives while also cultivating wellness outcomes for all participants.

Prevention Education

The goal of Prevention Education is to prevent and reduce underage use of alcohol, marijuana, tobacco, and other drugs in the Koreatown, Pico-Union, Westlake, and Metro Los Angeles areas and to encourage local community members to advocate for a safe and healthy community. We aim to address issues of retail access and availability of alcohol, marijuana, and tobacco, as well as transform the social norms that contribute to underage alcohol, marijuana, and tobacco use.

Recovery Services

KYCC’s Recovery Services is an outpatient treatment program providing help for people facing drug and alcohol problems. Services are available to youth and adults age 12 and up. Treatment is individualized according to each person’s needs and preferences toward successful long-term recovery and includes counseling, case management, information and referral, and recovery support.

Youth Services

Youth Services academic support programs supplement school education and foster independent learning through out-of-school-time services for low-income children. Youth development and case management programs provide family support, life skills, leadership experience and enrichment for youth to become active community members. Our programs include the K-12 academic, Summer Day Camp, and high school volunteer/leadership programs.

MILESTONES 2022-2023

Environmental Services Expands

KYCC Environmental Services continues to grow in all of its initiatives, adding various roles to their team including Urban Forestry Administrator and Koreatown Community Engagement Specialist. In collaboration with the Los Angeles Office of Community Beautification, they also began the Graffiti Removal Pre-Apprentice Program, allowing pre-apprentices to acquire their MC3 certification, while also getting an opportunity to learn about various building trades and gain on-site training, enabling them to succeed in a future union apprenticeship.



Youth Services Partners with Hanmi Bank

Youth Services and Hanmi Bank have partnered for the Youth Financial Fitness Partnership program, which will provide kindergarten through high school students with classes on finances, savings, and investment. Led by teachers, financial experts, and Hanmi Bank employees, students will receive financial education tailored to each grade level and help them to develop an understanding of money, values, and concepts that will foster healthy financial habits as they become future leaders.

Prevention Education Hosts Summer Leadership Program

Prevention Education's MacArthur Park Community Initiative organized its first MYPARC Summer Leadership Program with a group of 12 youth participants from schools throughout Los Angeles. The Leadership Program promoted smoke-free environments, encouraging the health of the Westlake community, with a series of family-friendly activities organized and led by the youth. Through the program, the youth developed leadership skills and educated community members on the importance of shared public spaces like MacArthur Park.



KYCC Launches Enhanced Care Management Program

KYCC's new Enhanced Care Management (ECM) program provides a whole-person-centered approach to healthcare, aiming to improve quality of care and reduce costs by supporting the high-needs members in our community. A new statewide Medi-Cal benefit, ECM services bring together a multidisciplinary team of professionals who work collaboratively to identify and address each individual's physical, emotional, and social needs.

15 Years of PreGLAD at Kids Town Preschool

2023 marked 15 years of Kids Town's PreGLAD, Preschool Guided Language Acquisition Design, a multi-language early immersion program which began in 2008. Following a multi-year feasibility study, Kids Town launched its Korean-English Dual Language Immersion program in 2017, followed by its Korean-Spanish-English Triple Language Immersion program in 2019. With continuous support from The Carl & Roberta Deutsch Foundation, Kids Town proudly provides a language-rich early childhood education environment, fostering learning and social-emotional development.



Koreatown Storytelling Program Talks Food

Koreatown Storytelling Program (KSP) looked at the multicultural food landscape of our community and interviewed over 40 people from across the food industry in Koreatown, from restaurant managers, owners, and servers, to street vendors, a food critic and a heirloom seed cultivator. KSP also launched their popular intergenerational traditional foodmaking workshops, where community elders taught high school students how to make dishes from Guatemala and Korea.

Clinical Services Joins L.A. Neurofeedback Pilot Program

Funded by the Anthony and Jeanne Pritzker Family Foundation, five Clinical Services staff and two supervisors have been trained to incorporate neurofeedback into their therapy practice. Training the brain to improve functioning and self-regulation, research shows neurofeedback effectively improving symptoms linked to depression, anxiety, PTSD, and insomnia. Neurofeedback treatment is costly, preventing it from being accessible to low-income communities. However, this program allows us to bring this highly effective service to vulnerable communities often impacted by trauma and violence.



Recovery Services Awarded Youth Opioid Response Grant

Recovery Services was awarded The California Youth Opioid Response implementation grant from the California Institute for Behavioral Health Solutions, funded by the California Department of Health Care Services. Working in collaboration with KYCC's Prevention Education and Koreatown Storytelling Program, Recovery Services expanded their services for youth and young adults by providing outreach and education, navigation, and treatment for youth, which will continue through Spring 2024.

Community Economic Development Provides Over \$22 Million in Tax Returns

This past tax season, KYCC's Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) program completed 15,683 tax returns, in collaboration with 23 Free Tax Prep LA partner agencies across Los Angeles County. With the support of 257 volunteers, who gave over 3,400 hours to help our community get refunds in their pockets, \$22,418,029 in tax refunds were returned to clients.



Housing Broadens Partnership with LAHSA

In partnership with the Los Angeles Homeless Services Authority (LAHSA), our Housing program acquired an additional 40 slots for the Time Limited Subsidy Program, allowing KYCC to support households experiencing homelessness by allowing them to access permanent housing quickly and for a limited time. As a result, we provided housing to 10 additional individuals and have been able to ensure that 8 current households transitioned into more stable, lasting accommodations.




